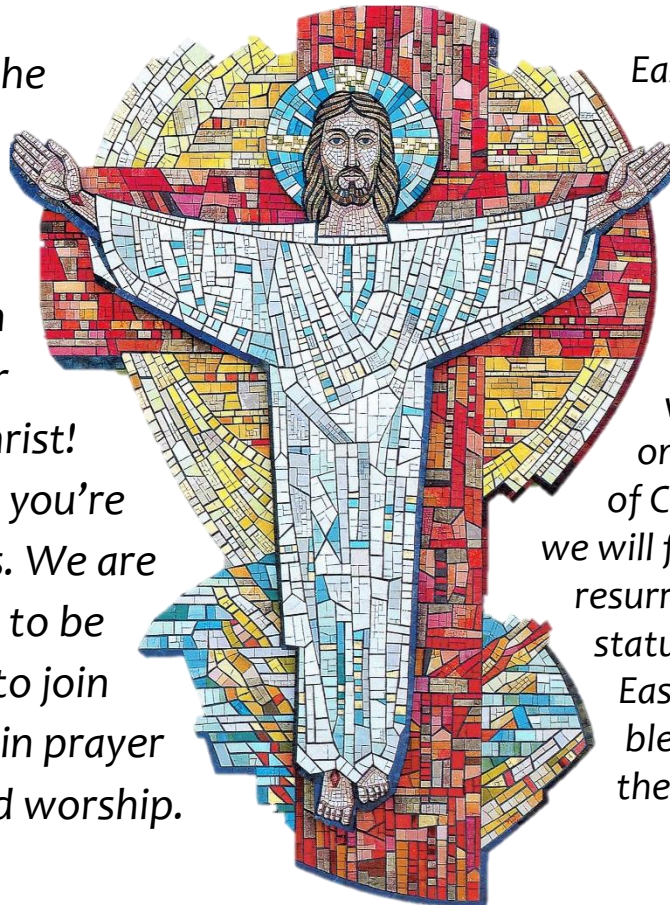

ACTS 10:34-43

Reader A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: “I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.”

SECOND LESSON

1 CORINTHIANS 15:1-11

Reader A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you – unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them – though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

- ❖ **WEEKLY EUCHARIST** – We continue to hold a weekly in-person, outdoor Eucharist on **Sunday afternoons at 12:15 pm**. The services are limited to approximately 12 people and require [online registration](#). The services last approximately 20-30 minutes and are held at the rear of the playground. Communion includes distribution of the consecrated host only, not the wine. If you wish to sit, please bring your own chair; you are also welcome to stand. Masks and social distancing are required. Please bring a Book of Common Prayer or a device to access the [Eucharist online](#).
- ❖ **WEDNESDAY WEAVINGS** – Join the St. George’s adult discussion group as we re-gather after our Lenten break this **Wednesday, April 7th, from 7:00-8:00 pm**, via Zoom. We are currently reading and discussing *The Way of Love*. All are welcome to join the group for discussion and a closing service of Compline. Frances Rickard will send the reading along with the Zoom link to the group’s email list before the meeting. If you are not on the list and would like to receive the email, or if you have any questions, please contact Frances at fajrickard@gmail.com.
- ❖ **WOMEN’S BOOK GROUP** – Please join us for our next meeting on **Saturday, April 10th, from 3:00 to 5:00 pm**, via Zoom. We will discuss *The Water Dancer*, by **Ta-Nehisi Coates**. All St. George’s women are welcome to attend – even if you haven’t read the book! We hope you can join us for interesting conversation and our book discussion. The Zoom invitation will be sent out to the group’s email list prior to the meeting. - ❖ **IN-PERSON WORSHIP** – As COVID rates continue to drop, and increasing numbers of people are getting vaccinated, St. George’s is planning for a return to in-person worship in the church, tentatively beginning on **Sunday, April 18th**. To maintain safety, parishioners will only sit in every third pew, and we will not receive wine at communion. Coffee hour will be a few steps down the path, and we ask that everyone wear a mask throughout the service (extras will be available at church in case you forget yours). The services will include a mix of live and pre-recorded music. We ask that those in church listen and enjoy the music but not sing along (we know that will be difficult for some!), since indoor singing is a particularly dangerous activity in terms of spreading the virus. Initially, the services will be limited to 20 attendees, in addition to the worship leaders, and registration will be required in order to maintain safe numbers. (More information about how to register will be forthcoming.) The service will continue to be accessible via both Zoom and Facebook Live.
- ❖ **WOMEN’S RETREAT** – As the COVID situation continues to change for the better, we have decided to hold this year’s Women’s Retreat, from **Friday, April 23 to Sunday, April 25**, at **Well Spring Retreat Center** at Wessendorff Ranch in Blanco, Texas. The cost for the weekend, which covers all meals and the facility fees, is \$50.00.
